During the quarter, the Rockwell Civitan Club sponsored a Raffle Drawing for a huge stuffed di-





About sixty people are in need of a hot breakfast each morning around this time of year, and they are so grateful for our service that they thank us profusely every time we go.






This event requires about 250 hours of preparation each year. The Preparations begin in December. The games always take place the week after the state basketball playoffs are completed.

2018 CLAXTON FRUIT CAKE SALES

NCDW Civitan Clubs:

It is my understanding that Civitan International and Claxton Bakery, Inc, no longer have the relationship previously shared, and Civitan International will no longer be a conduit for NCDW clubs selling Claxton Fruit Cakes. However, that option is still available to our NCDW clubs. The following is my understanding of how Fruit Cake sales by NCDW clubs will happen this year:

GENERAL SALES:

- Cost per pound, FOB, Claxton, GA = \$2.64/pound for 1 lb cellophane wrapped fruit cake
- Cost per pound, FOB, Claxton, GA for 1 lb Color Carton=
 \$2.74/pound (this is a brighter colored wrapped cake)
- The upcharge for the 48-1 lb. display will be an additional \$.10/pound
- Shipping charge per pound is a guesstimate of around 2 cents per pound, but this depends entirely on the amount of fruit cake shipped. This is only for those ordering directly with me and having the fruitcake shipped to the Wadesboro address below. If your club chooses to have fruitcake directly shipped to your location, the cost will be similar to last year and different from what is listed above, this will be per the arrangement be tween your club and Claxton.
- NCDW fruit cake order (ordered through me as the Fundraising Chair) will be sent to Martin Furniture Ware house, 1367 US Highway 74 West, Wadesboro NC. (This location was arranged through

Woody Pliescott of the Wades boro Club.) The date of ship ment to this location, and your club pick-up at this location, will be on October 6 from 8:00 - 12:00 noon. All cake must be picked up by noon. Your club should have a U-Haul, pick-up truck, or trailer if orders are large as your order will be on a pallet. Each order is palletized separately, shrink-wrapped and labelled, per Dale Parker at Claxton.

- Your club will be invoiced di rectly from Claxton Bakery, Inc.
- I must have your fruit cake order no later than Septem ber 10, 2018

STORE CREDIT PROGRAM:

- Each club participating in the local grocery store credit program must order at least 500 pounds of fruitcake.
- Your club will receive a set rebate amount per pound for Claxton Fruit Cake sold by your claimed and participating grocery store(s), below. No rebate amount has been determined at this point (I would assume, but may be wrong, that the rebate amount would be in the same ballpark as years previous).
- Participating Grocery stores from which you may get a store credit are:
 - Food Lion Stores
 - Publix Supermarkets
 - Food City
 - Winn-Dixie Stores
 - Bi-Lo Stores
 - Harris-Teeter Stores
 - The Kroger Company
 - Meijer Supermarkets

- In order for your Civitan Club to claim a store within a chain, a member of the club must take on the responsibility of visiting the store and making certain that Claxton Fruit Cakes are on the shelf and available for sale. In the event the product is not in stock in the local store, the club representative should ask the store personnel to check into the matter. Hence, the "store credit" is earned by the club. All store credits will be limited to those stores located in the "service area" of the local, qualifying Civitan Club.
- To participate in the store re bate program you must report to me the store number and store location "NOW". (You will need to visit your local grocery store and get the store num ber.)

Please let me know as soon as possible if your club will be purchasing Claxton Fruit Cake to be sold by your club AND if you will be participating in the "Store Credit Program" along with the store locations and numbers, if so.


